# Lesson 1 Asking and Answering Yes/No Questions

Students learn how to engage in conversational exchanges and express ideas on familiar topics by asking yes/no questions and responding using phrases and short sentences.







# A. Asking and Answering Yes/No Questions

## Input #1: Asking Yes/No Questions

Hold up the **Asking Yes/No Questions Picture Cards** and model <u>asking</u> the following yes/no questions. These cards help to scaffold asking questions.

- "Do you like hamburgers?"
- "Do you like pizza?"
- "Do you like cookies?"

Note: Students may respond non-verbally such as a nod, or a simple yes or no, which is fine, but continue modeling asking the questions.

Use the additional **Asking Yes/No Questions Picture Cards** to continue modeling asking questions.

- "Do you wear shoes?"
- "Do you use a computer?"

## Check for Understanding

Observe students as they practice asking questions.

- Invite students to ask you questions using the same question cards that were used for practice.
- Respond to students using a complete sentence. This will also be an opportunity for students to hear different types of responses. Below are some examples:
  - Student: Do you like pizza? Teacher: Yes, I like to eat pizza.
  - Student: Do you have shoes? Teacher: Yes, I have shoes on my feet.
- Use the rubric below to assess students' responses.

3	The student <u>asks</u> a complete question using correct syntax.
2	The student asks a question but does <u>not</u> use correct syntax. Example: "You do like the chips?"
1	The student attempts to <u>ask</u> a question but has missing words and incorrect syntax.
0	No response



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#### Input #2: Answering Yes/No Questions

Model answering yes/no questions using the **Answering Yes/No Questions Picture Cards**. These cards help to scaffold answering questions.

- Point to the picture and the question mark and say, "Do you like pizza?"
- Point to the yes/no answers and the picture and say, "Yes, I like pizza", or "No, I do not like pizza."

Use the additional **Answering Yes/No Questions Picture Cards** to continue modeling how to <u>answer</u> questions.

- "Do you wear shoes?" "Yes, I wear shoes on my feet."
- "Do you have a computer?" "Yes, I have a computer on my desk."

## **Check for Understanding**

Observe students as they practice answering Yes/No questions.

- Invite students to <u>answer</u> questions using the same cards that were used for **Answering** Yes/No Questions Picture Cards practice.
- Use the rubric below to assess students' responses.

3	The student <u>asks</u> a complete question using the correct syntax.
2	The student asks a question but does <u>not</u> use the correct syntax. Example: "You do like the chips?"
1	The student attempts to <u>ask</u> a question but has missing words and incorrect syntax.
0	No response



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#### Collaborative Practice Task #1: Asking Yes/No Questions

- Divide students into pairs or small groups of no more than 4 participants.
- Place Asking Yes/No Question Picture Cards in a pile in front of students.
- Students take turns selecting a card and asking a question only.
- If the question is correctly asked, the student keeps the card. If the student is unable to ask a question, put it at the bottom of the pile.
- Once there are no longer any cards left in the deck, the student with the most picture cards wins the round.

#### Collaborative Practice Task #2: Answering Yes/No Questions

- Divide students into pairs or small groups of no more than 4 participants.
- Provide each student pair with a set of **Answering Yes/No Question Picture Cards** (no more than 8 cards).
- Ask students to place the cards in a pile between them.
- Student #1 in the group picks up a question card from a pile and asks a question. Student #2 responds.
- If a question is asked and answered by the students, then the card is removed from the pile.
- If a question cannot be asked or answered, then the card goes back to the bottom of the pile.

	Teachers may want to participate in the Collaborative Practice activity if there is only a small number of students in the group.				
Helpful Hints	Teachers will need to create several card decks if there is more than one group working on the activity.				
	Student groups should be in proximity of one another so the teacher can observe the students, reinforce procedures, or to clarify understanding.
